### Voting for the Environment

The natural environment is one of Maine's most precious assets. For the health of our economy and quality of life, protecting our air, water, forests, and wildlife is extremely important. During each session of the Maine Legislature, our elected representatives determine the fate of bills that can have major implications – positive and negative – on the long-term quality of our environment. For these reasons, it is important for Maine people to know how their elected representatives voted on the most important environmental protection issues that have come before the Legislature.

That is why the Maine League of Conservation Voters (Maine LCV) has issued a scorecard at the end of each two-year legislative cycle since 1986 with the environmental voting record for every member of the Maine State House of Representatives and Senate.

The 119th Legislature enacted many important bills that add to the level of protection of Maine's environmental resources. Lawmakers approved and sent to the voters a \$50 million bond to purchase public lands. They also enacted new laws to reduce mercury pollution, establish Maine's first ecological reserves, promote the purchase of clean-burning vehicles, and curb sprawl.

As this year's Environmental Scorecard reveals, Maine's legislators during the 1999 and 2000 legislative sessions appeared to be more in touch with the public's strong support for environmental protection than in previous years. On average, Maine's legislators cast pro-environment votes 58 % of the time on a broad range of important environmental roll call votes that came before the House and Senate during the 119th Legislature. 56 Legislators earned very strong environmental ratings (a score of 80% or higher), yet 23 had sharply anti-environmental records (a score of 20% or lower).

The kind of information provided by the Maine LCV scorecard is important for Maine voters to consider as they evaluate the performance of their elected representatives. Our elected officials must be held accountable for the votes they cast on bills to conserve and protect Maine's environment. Maine needs a Legislature comprised of representatives who have a strong commitment to the careful stewardship of our state's natural resources.

The Maine League of Conservation Voters urges you to be an informed voter. Please communicate with your representatives. Ask questions about the environmental positions of new candidates. Join other voters who believe in greater accountability for our elected officials by supporting the Maine League of Conservation Voters today.

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# Explanation of the Maine LCV Voting Charts

The 1999-2000 Maine League of Conservation Voters (Maine LCV) Environmental Scorecard provides the voting record of each state legislator on important bills relating to environmental issues addressed during the 119th Legislature for which roll call votes were available. The votes tabulated are the final roll call votes for each bill.

Any vote by itself may not be a fair benchmark of a legislator's environmental record. However, the percentage of pro-environmental votes cast, based on a series of votes as represented here, provides a reliable indication of a legislator's overall environmental record.

Voting on important issues is a key responsibility of legislators. Therefore, the Maine LCV scores each unexcused absence as an anti-environmental vote. In addition to determining the environmental scores for your legislators, you should note the number of times that your state representatives failed to vote on important environmental matters.

Please keep in mind the following additional considerations when reviewing this scorecard:

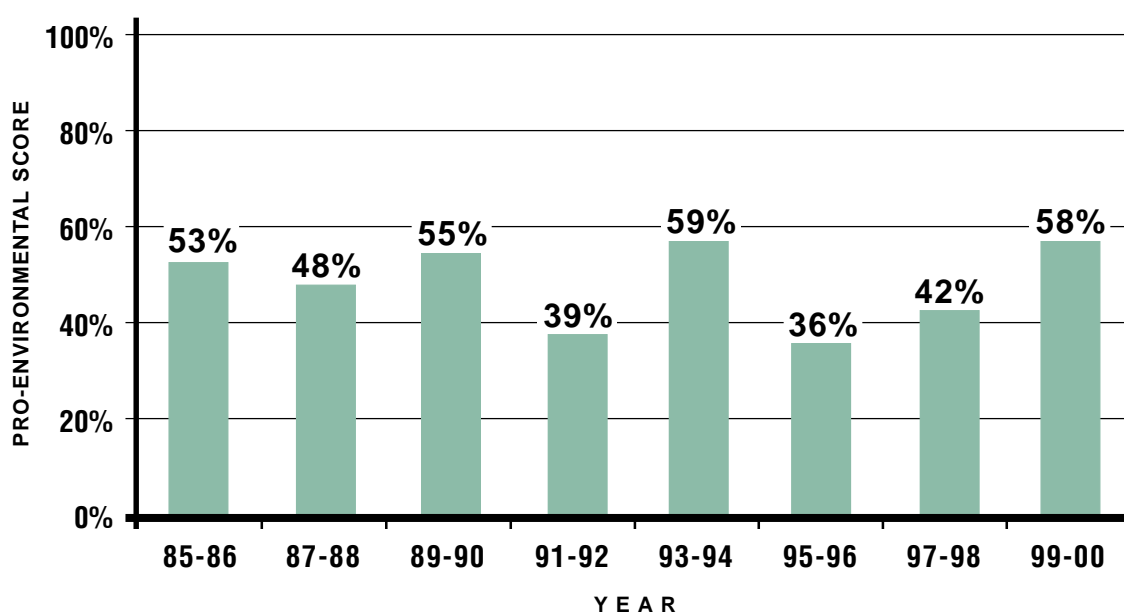
- Several important environmental bills addressed by the Legislature during the past two years are not included in this scorecard because roll call votes were not taken.
- In comparing ratings among legislators, differences of 10 to 15 percent may not be very significant, but differences of 25 percent or greater are very revealing.
- The votes and ratings provided in this scorecard only measure decisions on roll call votes on the floor of the House and Senate, and do not include committee votes.
- Occasionally a pro-environmental legislator may intentionally vote the wrong way for procedural reasons. It is not possible to reflect such a consideration within this voting record.
- Active leadership is very important to the fate of environmental legislation. Sponsoring bills, leading a floor debate, forging important compromises, derailing environmentally damaging proposals, and convincing other legislators to vote correctly are critical. However, this scorecard cannot quantify such activities.

With regard to upcoming elections, the Maine LCV scorecard only includes the environmental records of those candidates who served in the Legislature during the past two years. To determine which candidates are seeking your vote at the polls, contact the Maine LCV at (207) 373-1200, the Clerk of the House at (207) 287-1400, or the Secretary of the Senate at (207) 287-1540. We encourage you to directly ask each candidate to articulate their position on the issues included in this scorecard as well as on other environmental topics.

## \* JET SKIS

**LD 106:** This bill would have repealed restrictions on personal watercraft (jet skis) enacted by the Legislature in 1998. It would have eliminated the process which allows municipalities to seek regulations on personal watercraft, and would have opened up 242 lakes and ponds within Maine's unorganized territories to use by jet skis. In addition, it would have overturned the ban on personal watercraft on five ponds located in Acadia National Park. Jet skis threaten wildlife habitat and create noise pollution, especially in parks and remote areas. The bill was killed by the Legislature.

## \* TAKINGS

**LD 470:** This bill would have seriously undermined efforts to protect the environment and public health by requiring state and local governments to compensate landowners if regulations reduced property values by more than 50 percent. In 1996 the Legislature rejected a similar bill and established a mediation process to address concerns regarding private property rights. The House narrowly defeated this bill, while the Senate killed it by a wide margin.

## \* ECOLOGICAL RESERVES

**LD 477:** This bill was completely revised by the Agriculture, Conservation and Forestry Committee. The final version authorizes the Bureau of Parks and Lands (BPL) to establish Maine's first "ecological reserves on public lands to protect representative examples of Maine's ecosystem types." Timber harvesting, commercial mining, and excavation of sand and gravel are prohibited on ecological reserves. BPL may designate up to 15% of the acreage within its jurisdiction (approximately 100,000 acres) as ecological reserves. These reserves represent an important step in helping safeguard ecological diversity in Maine. The bill passed the Legislature and was signed into law.

# DESCRIPTION OF VOTES

## \* LIMIT PUBLIC LAND

**LD 727:** This bill would have severely limited efforts to protect land in Maine by prohibiting the State from owning more than 7% of the total land area of Maine or 10% of the land area of any county. Maine currently has one of the lowest levels of public land in the nation (less than 6%). Numerous votes and polls in recent years show that there is broad consensus to acquire more public land in Maine. The bill was killed by the Legislature.

## \* RELAXING ENFORCEMENT

**LD 749:** This bill would have prohibited the Land Use Regulation Commission (LURC) from imposing a fine on first-time violators of environmental rules within the unorganized territories of Maine. By giving businesses and others permission to violate environmental regulations and get away with it, the bill would have seriously weakened enforcement of environmental regulations within Maine's extraordinary wildlands. The bill was killed by the Legislature.

## \* FORESTRY INFORMATION

**LD 1144:** This bill would have provided the public with expanded information regarding forestry practices. The Maine Forest Service would have been required to publicly release statistics on how many acres of forest are annually clearcut, treated with herbicides, turned into tree plantations, and converted to non-forest uses by paper companies and landowners owning more than 100,000 acres. The Maine Forest Service currently keeps this information confidential. The bill was killed by the Legislature.

## \* MERCURY POLLUTION

**LD 2084:** This bill will help curb mercury pollution in Maine by requiring recycling of mercury-containing products such as fluorescent bulbs, thermostats, and electrical switches. As amended by the Natural Resources Committee, disposal by businesses of products containing mercury will be banned after July 15, 2002, and by households as of January 2005. The bill also requires establishment of a household hazardous waste collection program. The bill passed the Legislature and was enacted into law.

## \* CUT AND RUN LOGGING

**LD 2179:** This bill would have required the Maine Forest Service (MFS) to develop recommendations to address liquidation ("cut and run") logging and other unsustainable forestry practices. The MFS already has documented that liquidation logging is a serious problem in Maine, affecting as many as 47,000 acres annually. The bill was killed.

## \* LAND BOND

**LD 2253:** This bill authorized sending a \$50 million bond measure to Maine voters to help fund the acquisition of public land through the Land for Maine's Future program. The bill required matching funds of \$25 million from private or other public sources. The bill was passed by the Legislature, the bond measure appeared on the November 1999 ballot, and was enacted into law. Under Maine's constitution a bond question must receive the vote of 2/3rds of elected Legislators to be sent to the voters. This question nearly failed in the House, where it received the minimum number of votes required.

## \* CORPORATE ACCOUNTABILITY

**LD 2526:** This bill would have suspended for three months certain public subsidies to businesses that were not in compliance with Maine's environmental laws. Corporate subsidies, such as the Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement (BETR) program, would be reinstated once the company was certified as being back in compliance. The Natural Resources Committee rewrote the bill so that it denied BETR subsidies only if a business was found to be in criminal violation of environmental laws, based on the premise that environmental criminals should not be subsidized. The business lobby strongly opposed the bill and it was killed by the Legislature.

## \* SALMON PROTECTION

**LD 2579:** This bill would have increased threats to Maine's wild Atlantic salmon, which currently is under review for listing as an endangered species under the Federal Endangered Species Act. The bill would have allowed a catch and release season for Atlantic salmon on so-called "restoration" rivers (the Penobscot, St. Croix and Saco), despite the recommendation of biologists from the Maine Atlantic Salmon Commission to close the season for all Atlantic salmon fishing in the state. The bill was killed by the Legislature.

## \* CURBING SPRAWL

**LD 2600:** This bill will help control sprawl by encouraging state investment in downtowns, by providing \$1.7 million to the State Planning Office to assist cities and towns with local planning efforts, and by providing \$100,000 to revitalize downtown areas. In addition, the Department of Education is required to adopt rules for the siting of new school construction. The bill passed the Legislature and was signed into law.

# Lessons from the Land Bond

## Some Legislators Not in Step With Their Constituents

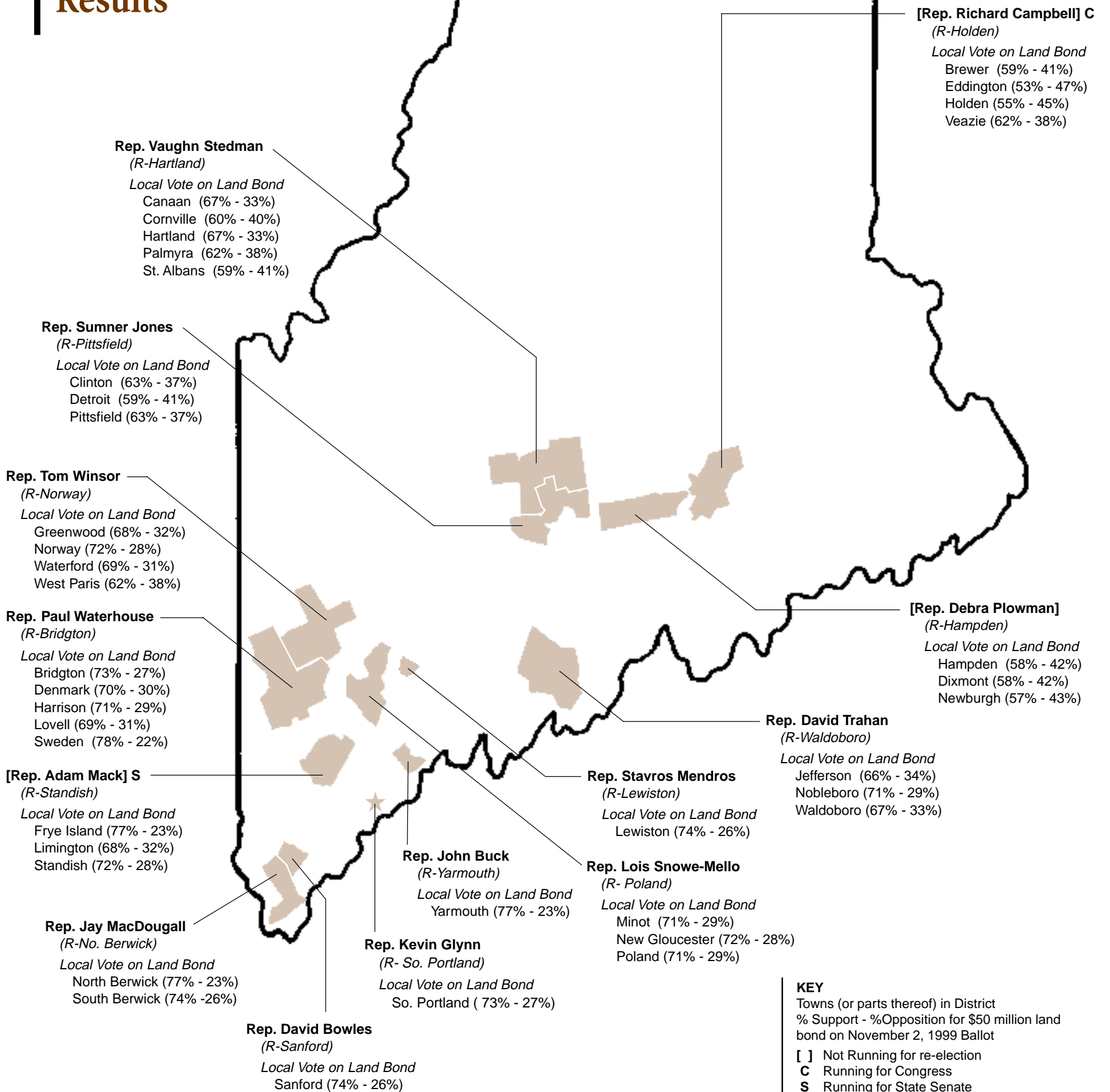
In November 1999, Maine people by an overwhelming margin voted in support of a \$50 million bond for the acquisition of public land. The land bond was approved 68-32% statewide, winning in all 16 counties. Despite this demonstration of strong support by Maine people for land conservation, the Maine House of Representatives almost killed the land bond. On June 5, 1999, the land bond was adopted by the *exact* vote needed for passage – one additional vote against it and the land bond measure would not have appeared on the ballot.

The map on this page identifies 14 members of the Maine House of Representatives who voted *against* the land bond in the legislature but who represent districts that voted overwhelmingly in *support* of the land bond. These lawmakers appear to be out of step with the sentiment of their constituents on the important environmental issue of protecting special land throughout Maine before it is lost to development.
